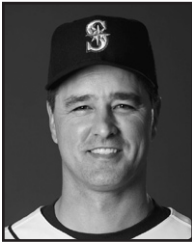


Adrian Beltre has won consecutive American League Gold Gloves at Third Base.

PERSONAL: Donald Wakamatsu... resides in North Richmond Hills, TX with wife, Laura, sons: Jacob and Lucas, and daughter Jady...becomes the first Asian American to be named manager of a Major League club...graduated from Hayward High School (CA) in 1981...three-sport prep star, lettering in baseball, basketball and football...earned four varsity letters under College Baseball Hall of Fame coach Jim Brock at Arizona State University (1982-85)...was the Sun Devils starting catcher from 1983-85, batting .314 (223x711) with 22 doubles, 3 triples, 18 home runs and 133 RBI in 196 career games with ASU...played in the 1983 and 1984 College World Series...three-time All-Pac-10 selection (1983-85)... team captain in 1985.

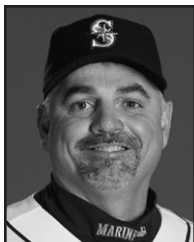
PLAYING CAREER: Selected by the Cincinnati Reds in the 11th round of the 1985 June draft...12 seasons as a catcher with seven organizations during his professional playing career from 1985-96...appeared in 18 Major League games with the Chicago White Sox in 1991...batted .226 (7x31) with one double...recorded first Major League hit May 22 at California...made his professional debut with Billings in the Pioneer League in 1985...all nine starts behind the plate came with knuckleballer Charlie Hough on the mound...went to Major League spring training with the Rangers in 1994...combined to bat .330 (115x348) in 113 games with Albuquerque (AAA) in 1992-93...missed parts of the 1993 and 1994 seasons with a torn ligament in his right elbow...topped Southern League catchers in fielding percentage at Birmingham in 1989 (.990) and Billings in 1985 (.998).

RICK ADAIR (40)

POSITION: Pitching Coach, former pitcher

AGE: 51

BORN: 1-19-1958 in Spartanburg, SC

BATTED: Left

THREW: Left

PERSONAL: Michael Richard "Rick" Adair...resides in Spartanburg, SC, with his wife, Louisa; has two sons, Dustin

(9/10/84) and Travis (10/23/87)... graduated from Spartanburg High School in 1976; played baseball, football and basketball in high school...won the Dobson Award as the school's top athlete and was Player of the Year in baseball in 1975 and 1976...attended Western Carolina University from 1977-80... he tossed a no-hitter vs. The Citadel

(the Southern Conference Champion) in 1979, his junior year, and was named team MVP that season... Adair is the nephew of former big leaguer Art Fowler and a cousin to Wayne Tolleson and Mike Tolleson.

MANAGING/COACHING CAREER: Is entering his first season as the Mariners pitching coach, but his sixth season as a Major League pitching coach...was the Detroit Tigers Major League pitching coach from Sept. 12, 1996 through the 1999 season...was the Cleveland Indians big league pitching coach in 1992 and 1993...Rick spent the past four seasons as the minor league pitching coordinator for the Texas Rangers...he filled the same role for four seasons (2000-2003) with Atlanta...those two stints sandwiched a year with New Hampshire, Toronto's AA club in the Eastern League...he was the Tigers roving minor league pitching coach in 1996, prior to his promotion to the Major League staff...he was pitching coach with Detroit's AAA Toledo club in 1995 and spent the 1994 season in the same role at AA Wichita in the Padres system...he began his coaching career in 1986 in the Cleveland Indians farm system, a position he held for six years.

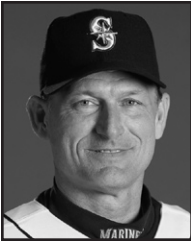
PLAYING CAREER: Selected by the Mariners in the third round of the 1979 June draft, and spent seven years in Seattle's farm system before elbow injuries ended his career...he compiled a lifetime mark of 44-46, with a 3.92 ERA in 214 appearances...was an All-Star at Wausau (Midwest League) in 1981 and at Lynn (International League) in 1982.

PERSONAL: Atlee Alan Cockrell...resides in Colorado Springs, CO with his wife, Tameson and children Ryan, Jake, Madelyn and Beau...attended the University of Tennessee where he was an All-American baseball player...was the Vols starting quarterback for two seasons (1982 and 1983)...helped lead the Vols to a Citrus Bowl title in 1983.

MANAGING/COACHING CAREER:

Is entering his first season as the Mariners hitting coach, but his fourth year as a big league hitting coach, overall...spent the previous two seasons as Colorado's Major League hitting coach...in 2007, the Rockies led the National League in batting (.280), hits (1591) and on-base percentage (.354) and reached the World Series...was also the Rockies ML hitting coach from April 29, 2002 thru the end of the season...was the hitting coach at AAA Colorado Springs for four seasons (2003-2006) prior to being promoted to the big league job...was Colorado's roving hitting instructor in 2001 and 2002...spent first two seasons in the Rockies player development system as a manager: in 1999 at Portland and in 2000 at Salem.

PLAYING CAREER: Was the ninth overall selection in the 1984 June Draft by the San Francisco Giants...spent nine seasons as a minor league outfielder...only Major League time was nine games with the Rockies in 1996, his final professional season...made ML debut Sept. 7, 1996 at the Astrodome, pinch-hitting against Billy Wagner (strikeout)...first ML hit was a pinch-hit double off Tom Glavine (ATL) Sept. 10.

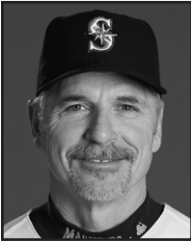

MANAGING/COACHING CAREER:

Bruce is in his first season as the Mariners third base coach, and his second season as a big league coach overall...was the California Angels first base coach in 1991... spent 23 season's in the Angels organization, the last six as the minor league field coordinator...has also overseen minor league outfield, baserunning and bunting instruction since 1996...minor league coaching career with the Angels included four seasons as infield instructor (2002-2005), one as roving outfield instructor (2001) and three as roving defense instructor (1998-2000)...spent seven seasons as a minor league manager in the Angels (1985-86, 1995-97) and Athletics (1992-93) systems...has a career minor league record of 278-233 (.544)...led Vancouver (AAA) to the PCL playoffs with a first place, first-half finish in 1997...spent two years at Single-A Salem (1985-86) and led the A's Arizona Rookie team to league titles in 1992 and 1993 before moving to Arizona League Angels in 1995 and 1996...also served as an Angels scout for seven years (1984-90) while also working as a roving instructor (hitting in 1987 and defense 1988-90).

PLAYING CAREER: Was the San Diego Padres 18th round selection in the 1980 June Draft...spent three seasons in the San Diego and Oakland farm systems.

PERSONAL: Owen Lee Tinsley...resides in Scottsdale, AZ, with his wife, Susan and sons Kobie (10) and Ethan (5)...

graduated from Shelby County High School (Shelbyville, KY) in 1987; lettered in baseball, football, basketball and track...was named Gatorade National Player of the Year as a senior after hitting .569 with 16 home runs in 65 at-bats... played defensive back in football and turned down a scholarship to Purdue to sign with Oakland in 1987.

MANAGING/COACHING CAREER: Lee is in his first season as the Mariners first base coach, but his fourth season as a Major League first base coach overall...spent the past three seasons as the Arizona Diamondbacks first base coach...also worked with outfielders in Arizona...was the roving minor league outfield instructor for Arizona from 2003 thru 2005...held same position in the Anaheim system in 2002...began coaching career as hitting coach with El Paso (AA) in the Texas League.

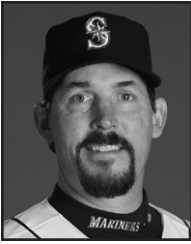
PLAYING CAREER: Selected by Oakland with its first pick (11th overall) in the 1987 June Draft...had a 14-year playing career, including spending time in the Majors with Seattle (1993, 1997), Boston (1994-1995, 1996) and Philadelphia (1996)...hit .241 (210x870) in 361 career Major League games...made Major League debut with Seattle in 1993 and returned to Mariners to close out big league career in 1997...made his ML debut as a defensive replacement April 6, 1993 vs. TOR...first ML hit was a pinch-hit single off Gregg Olson (BAL)...had a seven-hit game (7-for-8 with a triple, two home runs) with Calgary (at Las Vegas) after being optioned...was recalled and collected first ML home run July 21 at New York (off Steve Farr)...posted two longest hitting streaks of his career with the Red Sox in 1995, opening the season with a 14-game streak, and adding a 15-game string June 10-25.

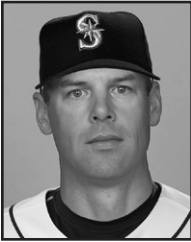

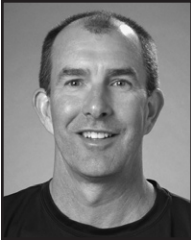
Hecht spent the past three seasons (2006-2008) as the Performance Coach for the Texas Rangers.

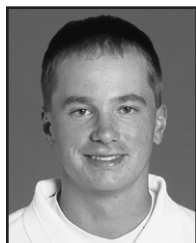


BILL SEPICH
